Anti- Bullying Policy



1. Purpose

To empower the school community, students, staff, parents and carers to recognise and respond appropriately to bullying and harassment and to contribute to the general health and wellbeing of all students. We recognise the need to create a culture of openness, transparency and support, underpinned by a strong student management system.

2. Definition

- 2.1 Bullying is repeated verbal, physical, social or psychological behaviour that is harmful and involves the misuse of power by an individual or group towards one or more persons.
- 2.2 Cyberbullying refers to bullying through information and communication technologies.
- 2.3 Bullying can involve humiliation, domination, intimidation, victimisation and all forms of harassment including that based on sex, race, disability, homosexuality or transgender.
- 2.4 Bullying of any form or for any reason can have long term effects on those involved including bystanders.
- 2.5 Conflict or fights between equals or single incidents are not defined as bullying.
- 2.6 Bullying behaviour can be:

Verbal	e.g. name calling, teasing, abuse, putdowns, sarcasm, insults, threats
Physical	e.g. hitting, punching, kicking, scratching, tripping, spitting
Social	e.g. ignoring, excluding, ostracising, alienating, making inappropriate gestures
Psychological	e.g. spreading rumours, dirty looks, hiding or damaging possessions, malicious SMS and online messages, inappropriate use of camera phones

3. Responsibility

3.1 Everyone in the school should be aware of the indication of potential bullying and should act in response to these situations

3.2 Staff:

Teachers are responsible for the explicit teaching of positive behaviours for learning. Units of work around positive relation building are programmed from 7 - 12 through the PDHPE curriculum, YAP and student well-being programs.

- 3.3 All staff should respond to bullying by:
 - 1. Listening to the student
 - 2. Reassuring the student by offering help, advice and support
 - 3. Making it clear to the target and the accused that the bullying behaviours is not acceptable and a full and fair investigation will be carried out
 - 4. Making a case by case judgement and follow the existing school discipline procedures based on frequency and severity of incidents. (refer to the Action to be taken)

4. Parents


- 4.1 If you suspect that your child is involved in bullying at school, whether as a victim or as an aggressor, respond by:
 - a. Listening carefully and sympathetically, whilst establishing the relevant facts
 - b. Encouraging your child to tell someone at school or informing the school directly
 - c. Working with the school to resolve the issue/s

5. Students

Students are required to:

- 5.1 Follow the DoE and NHS 'Behaviour Code for Students' which states that students are not to bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our school
- 5.2 Report incidences of bullying to a staff member
- 5.3 Work with staff and other students to resolve the situation
